Beta Sigma Beta House Benefits from Renovations Ensuring Safety and Comfort for Undergraduates and Visiting Alumni

Updates to Hot Water and Heating Systems, Fire Sprinklers and Landscaping Make House More Competitive

Over these past few summers, Beta Sigma Beta has undergone significant renovations that will benefit Beta Sigma Beta for years to come. These renovations include: new indoor fire sprinklers, a new heating system, the boilers, and the outside landscaping.

Incoming Beta Alumni Association President Addresses Undergraduates' Parents Regarding His Strict Upholding of Behavioral Expectations

Reprint of Mailing Reminds Everyone of Commitment to Excellence

Below is a reprint of a letter sent to the undergraduates' parents from **David Lipson '65**, the incoming president of the Beta Alumni Association. For those of you who don't know David, he has held a variety of alumni association positions over a long period of time, including having served as president once before. He has consented to a one-year term in office with some very narrow objectives focused on making the undergraduate fraternity experience fun and SAFE. David's challenges include, but are not limited to, completely eliminating "hazing" during pledging and eliminating property damage.

David is currently the president of the Beta State Foundation, which had granted \$10,000 of scholarships annually to members of the undergraduate chapter for academic excellence or outstanding leadership through example. David has been in the information technology business since 1968. He is the CEO and chairman of MODA Technology Partners, a software firm selling into the biopharmaceutical marketplace, and he is chairman of the board of Vita Food Products (the nationwide leader in herring).

Unquestionably, David Lipson is the epitome of what Beta Sig is about, and, in its history, he stands out as the most important contributor... not just of money, but of time. David has agreed to step in to take the alumni president role, again, because no other alumnus was willing to step up and manage the brotherhood's high-risk behavior.

Dear Beta Sig Parents:

My name is David Lipson and I am a 1965 graduate of Penn State and a member of the Beta Alumni Association (BAA). On September 1, 2007, I will become the president of the BAA and will have the responsibility for the undergraduate chapter at 255 E. Fairmount Ave. in State College. I have always loved Beta Sig. When I was a pledge, my dad had multiple, serious operations and 27 brothers donated blood (and caused a significant disruption in the basement level of Chestnut Hill Hospital). I knew then that Beta Sig was to be an important part of my life. When I was remarried six-and-a-half years ago, there were 17 Beta Sigs from seven different graduating classes at my wedding. My very best friends are my brothers and most did not graduate with me. If you ask around, you will find that I have consistently been a part of "our thing" for 40+ years.

I have accepted the responsibility of this position for one year. I have a very narrow set of objectives and hope you will support me in achieving them.

I would have liked to tell you that my first objective would be to maintain the fraternity's legacy of outstanding academic achievement. Additionally, I would have liked to have you support me in continuing the fraternity's leadership in philanthropic activities (Thon and CAN). Finally, I would have asked for your help ensuring our kids get the maximum benefits from the undergraduate fraternity experience at PSU (that would include social activities). But, given our selection criteria, our history, our tradition, and the processes now in place, I have a strong feeling that those goals will be achieved even with the most modest support and guidance from the BAA and similar input from our parents.

Where I really need your help is in the reduction of high-risk behavior. I am not ready to receive the telephone call from the Centre Area Hospital that one of our children is seriously hurt or worse. Since I expect my son to be a pledge, the contemplation of such a call is an anathema. During 2006-2007 we have experienced multiple incidents of destruction of personal property and damage to the physical structure (while intoxicated). We had two members admitted to the ER (while intoxicated). Last year, sons and daughters of alumni (who have donated their time and money to ensure a quality experience for your children) were intimidated, hazed and verbally abused. Last year the quantity of alcoholic beverages consumed per brother

was far beyond your capacity to understand and accept.

Even though the University is facing similar challenges throughout the Greek system, we cannot let this behavior continue at Beta Sig. If we cannot modify this behavior, we may be forced to close a fraternity whose 90+ years of history are filled with excellence in academics, athletics, philanthropy, student government and candidly, fantastic social activities. We will close a facility and organization that your children will tell you they love.

As a parent, an alumnus and as the person who does not want to get "the call," here is where I am: My "job" is to ensure the safety of our children. To achieve that single goal, I am going to implement the following:

1. If your son is involved in hazing (physically or verbally) of pledges, he will be immediately disaffiliated from the fraternity and expelled from the structure within 24 hours. If your son observes hazing and does not intercede, he will be disaffiliated and expelled from the fraternity within 24 hours. If your son is aware of hazing and does not report it to the BAA, he will be disaffiliated and expelled. <u>Simply stated, anyone</u> who directly participates, observes and

Kudos to Adam Dorfman '07 and Andrew **Moses '07** for working tirelessly to create this event from scratch and ensure its future success. The CAN/AS event was the foundation of Beta Sig's two consecutive Chapter of Excellence awards, an honor earned by only three of the more than fifty fraternities at Penn State.

Our alumni leadership set guidelines for the undergraduates that were mindful of our primary goal, which is to foster a healthy and safe environment while still allowing them to enjoy their time as Beta Sig undergraduates, just as we did. As adult managers, the alumni must continually challenge our undergraduates to manage themselves responsibly and require each of them to be accountable for their actions.

I must thank all of my fellow board members for their assistance and support in making the necessary physical and policy changes at the house, often in the faces of great resistance. Equally as important, very special thanks to all who followed my lead by contributing at least \$25,000 to the Beta State Foundation for making the physical improvements needed to preserve the Beta Sig House: the "Grossman Family" (Richard '54, Alan '58 and Andy '90), David Lipson, David Rosenberg '74, Bruce Grossman '79 and Simon Ziff '87 and, most importantly, Stuart Levin '71, who was the first alumnus to step up and commit to this project. does not intercede, or observes and does not report the incident will be reported to the Township authorities and the University Office Judicial Affairs. As you may know, hazing is a violation of State College, University and BAA rules and regulations and Commonwealth statues. Hazing is a level three misdemeanor, punishable by fine, incarceration or both.

 If your son is involved in destruction of personal property or the physical structure, he will be subject to the "one strike and you're out" rule. Damages will be assessed against the House Repair and Activity Fund and the offender will be reported to the police and the University Office of Judicial Affairs. He will be disaffiliated and expelled within 24 hours.

3. If your son is involved with intimidating a child of a current or past alumni officer or board member, he will be disaffiliated and expelled within 24 hours and considered to have been involved with hazing. The State College Police and the University will be notified.

If you did not know it, in 2005, 1700 college students were involved in alcoholrelated deaths. Some 500,000 students were involved in non-life threatening, alcoholrelated, injuries. There were approximately 34,000 alcohol-related sexual assaults. These are real statistics, with real kids and real parents.

If you believe I have missed the point of my responsibilities, please e-mail me. I can assure you that I am dedicated to ensuring your son has a safe, fun and academically challenging experience at Penn State and Beta Sig.

Community Involvement and Online Auction Contribute to Doubling Total from 2006

Beta Sig continues its reign atop the philanthropy scene at Penn State with another record-breaking philanthropic effort. On April 14, 2007, Beta Sig, along with our sorority partner Pi Beta Phi, coordinated and hosted the 2nd annual "We Are... Curing Autism Now 5K Race/ 3K Walk."

In 2007, we welcomed over 750 participants to the event and raised over \$201,000 for the Cure Autism Now/Autism Speaks Foundation (CAN/AS). This total shattered the event's 2006 total of \$91,000.

In the weeks preceding the event, Beta Sig captured the community's attention about this worthy cause. Through our media partnership with Magnum Broadcasting, hundreds of radio commercials aired advertisements for the event to the public. In the week prior to the event, the event's coordinators appeared on

radio talk shows promoting the event.

Steve Jones, the radio voice of Penn State athletics, was on-hand again as the honorary emcee of the event. Also in attendance as a celebrity grand marshal was Steve Smear, captain of the 1968 Penn State football team. Smear has an autistic son and proudly got involved in our effort.

The members of Beta Sig marked the start of the event with a kickoff celebration at the fraternity house on April 13th. Joan and William Schreyer, the same individuals who endowed the Schreyer's Honors College at Penn State, sponsored the kickoff celebration. Beta Sig welcomed parents, alumni, and distinguished guests to all of the festivities as the event coincided with Beta Sig's Parents' Weekend.

The event also featured an online auction with once-in-a-lifetime fantasy experiences, Penn State football tickets, and unique sports memorabilia up for bid. Four of Penn State's football coaches, including Tom Bradley (Defensive Coordinator), Bill Kenney (offensive tackles and ends), and Larry Johnson Sr. (Defensive Line Coach), auctioned off dinners with themselves to support our event and raised thousands of dollars.

Another exciting auction item included seats for two in University President Graham Spanier's luxury suite for a Penn State football game and invitations to the president's tailgate. All of the items were available online to a national audience in the days leading up to and following April 14th.
