Former Beta Sigma Rho President Passes Away

Beta Sig must sadly report on the passing



of former President **Robert Lyons '48**. Bob was a communityminded business leader, educator, philanthropist, coach

and proud member of

our fraternity. He died on October 19, 2012, with his wife of 64 years, JoAnne, by his side.

Bob first came to Penn State in 1942; however, his college career was interrupted briefly when he enlisted in the Navy in 1944, at which time he proudly served in the South Pacific Theatre during World War II.

After returning to Penn State in 1946, Bob became president of Beta Sigma Rho. He met JoAnne Kranich, the sister of his roommate, **Robert Kranich '48**. JoAnne and Bob later married in the summer of 1948, shortly after graduation. Later, Bob went on to become Beta Sigma Rho's national president.

In 1950, Bob and JoAnne moved to Lewisburg, where they opened The Lyons Shop, a popular, upscale women's dress shop and bridal salon, and continued to work side by side for 34 years. During this time, Bob and JoAnne expanded the business by adding a second store in Selinsgrove and opening a bath and bed store.

In 1978, Bob started the retail business curriculum at the Williamsport Area Community College (now Penn Tech) as part of the college's business department. He taught full time until 1986 when he went to work as director of sales at PGS, one of the originators of a national mail-in prescription drug program. During this time, Bob was also a consultant with the Small Business Administration, where he worked closely with Charles Coder, the founder of the SBA program at Bucknell University.



In 1990, Bob started a new business, GCP, which was one of the first companies in the country to develop and utilize a networking program allowing for employees to purchase prescription drugs directly from local pharmacies.

Having a strong desire to give back to the community he loved, Bob spent decades volunteering, including as a member of the Lewisburg Area School District school board, where he served as president, the Lewisburg Zoning Hearing Board, the Union County Planning Commission, Central Susquehanna Intermediate Unit, and the Lions Club.

Bob had many hobbies and activities. In addition to being a lifelong New York Yankees and Penn State football fan, he volunteered as a swim coach for the Sunbury YMCA, where for many years he conducted early morning swim practices, and started the Lewisburg Area High School Swimming Team.

Bob was a Beta Sig of outstanding character and his presence will be missed in our community.



"Earlier this season, I believe it was the Navy game, I sat directly in front of an elderly couple and their grown kids. Finally, **Andy Lyons '72** (the son) said that he recognized my name and face from Beta Sig. Andy then introduced me to his wife, Susan, and mother and father, JoAnne and Bob. Wow, what a Beta Sig family! In three hours that was interrupted by a football game, I learned a lot about **Robert Lyons '48** and his Beta Sig family lineage. Bobby was a Beta Sigma Rho. He married a Beta Sig little sister, and sister of fellow Beta Sig **Robert Kranich**, who was his roommate when they first met. I started to rattle off names of older guys—**Stan Eisman**, **Marty Leonard**, **Dave Lipson** and others—and he knew each and every one. We talked nonstop Beta Sig 1944 through 2012. Bobby shared poignant Beta Sig stories, all the while smiling ear to ear. Bobby's passion for Beta Sig and Penn State temporarily overwhelmed whatever pain he should have been experiencing while battling acute myeloid leukemia.

Rob Eisman recently notified me that Bobby passed away. We should all be grateful to Bobby for his service to the Beta Chapter of Beta Sig. On behalf of all Beta Sigs, we offer condolences to the Lyons and Kranich families. Life is short. Beta Sig hard!"

it was a late-night talk to keep our heads straight or his simple presence in a room, everything seemed to work out for the better. Lee is an example of one who knows how to run a successful fraternity.

What's your favorite Beta Sig tradition?

Larry: "Team unity" is by far my favorite Beta Sig tradition. That single tradition transcends every aspect of what we do; not only just among Beta Sig brothers, but also in the way we treat everyone in our lives. It fosters the opportunity to create lifelong friendships.
