Bob Jubelirer '59 Receives Top-3 Endorsement for PSU Board of Trustees

On March 17, 2014, PS4RS — Penn Staters for Responsible Stewardship — announced their three endorsements for the upcoming Penn State Board of Trustee election. One of those top

three was Beta Sig brother, **Bob Jubelirer '59**.

PS4RS posted the following about their endorsements: "If we have learned anything over the last few years, it's that there are far too many alumni with cour-

age, initiative and very impressive talents who should be replacing more than just three 'old guard' trustees each year in an effort to give back to Penn State all that it has given us." Congratulations, Bob, for standing out among the 32 candidates. We caught up with Bob in the company of three other Beta Sig brothers — Sy Delfiner '59, Sam Sidewater '59 and Ray Fireman '59. This group of four has stayed connected for over 55 years. We spoke with Bob about his professional life and his philosophy as he works toward a seat on the Penn State Board of Trustees. Here are five things you should know about Bob Jubelirer before you send in your vote.

#1: Bob spent 32 years in the Pennsylvania state government. He was President Pro Tempore of the Senate for more than 21 years. He also served as Lieutenant Governor. "When Nov. 9, 2011, came and Joe Paterno was fired, I decided that I could not sit back and do nothing. Everyday that I was in the Senate, I knew I could make a dif-*Continued on page 4*

Beta Sig Brings in \$90,000 FOR THE KIDS

It is a scene like none other. For those of you who have been part of THONs past, you know.

Where else can you go to experience the energy of a truly altruistic group of college students — complete with water pistols, balloons, games, plungers, hula hoops, crazy socks, line dances, pep rallies, inspirational speeches from some of Penn State's most notable personalities, incredibly choreographed performances and 46 hours of no sleep?

And it is all ... FOR THE KIDS ... to continue Penn State's 37-year tradition of saving children from the grip of pediatric cancer.

Thanks to our chapter's yearlong canning and fundraising efforts with Kappa Delta, we contributed \$90,000 toward Penn State's \$13,343.517.33 total that will be given to the Four Diamonds Fund at Penn State Hershey Children's Hospital. On Saturday afternoon, Jay Paterno former assistant football coach and son of Joe Paterno — paid a visit to the THON dancers. He summarized the impact of pediatric cancer in a very powerful way. "A couple of weeks ago, I was in Hershey and toured the children's hospital. The woman who runs the Four Diamonds Fund was asked what the survival rate was. She said, 'We save four out of every five children here.' I couldn't bear to be without one of my five kids. Think about that. That is why you are here ... because we are going to make it five out of every five ... Every year you do this, we are knocking at the door a little more and a little more. In the very near future, Penn State students are going to kick in that damn door."

As the crowd erupted in screams and applause, parents could be seen holding tightly to those THON children who have embraced the hearts of our Greek community at Penn State. It is the power of hope ... hope for one more day, week, month or year ... that our chapter is helping to give to families across the state. We are fortunate to be part of such a life-giving effort at Penn State that does, in fact, redefine the possibilities.

Also speaking to the dancers was Penn State's newly appointed football coach,

James Franklin. "Everybody thinks that what makes us special is the football stadium or the basketball arena. That has nothing to do with what makes us special. Making an Investment in Our Impressive Undergraduates ... Can We Count on You?

As you have read in our Senior Spotlight, Beta Sig has produced an impressive Class of 2014. Stop for a moment and think about those alumni who supported our journey as undergraduates. They saw something in us worth their time and donations — an investment worth

What if Beta Sig Decided to Ban Pledging?

Recently, Sigma Alpha Epsilon (SAE) made an announcement that represents a significant shift in the way the fraternity approaches new-member policies and practices. The simple answer? There will no longer be special policies and practices for new members.

As stated in their official press release, "Effective March 9, 2014, new-member (pledge) programming will be eliminated completely from our operations, and the classification of new member (pledge) will no longer exist. All chapters and colonies will be required to implement this important change." Is pledging becoming a thing of the past?

As the Greek community moves to strengthen its focus on leadership, scholarship and philanthropy, some are taking radical steps they hope will change the culture of chapters from drinking clubs to ... well, something more than drinking clubs. In the case of SAE, the mission is to "protect Sigma Alpha Epsilon's future and to eliminate a class structure between our new members and our active members ... [to] enhance the educational and leadership experience of our members and build upon their development

ference. There have been others elected to the Board of Trustees, including Anthony Lubrano, who are the new wave of reform. I want to be able to join them and break down the wall that the old guard maintained." To read Bob's full bio, go to www.bob4psuboard.com/about.

#2: Bob's legislative history illustrates his commitment to transparency and an open forum. "When I was working on the Sunshine Law, there were some who were resistant to change. This law allowed government meetings to be open to the public. It took five years to get a modern-day act through, but we did it. We have to let the sun shine through."

#3: It is time for a culture change at Penn State. "For many years, alumni have been shut out of any kind of ability to be part of the Penn State Board of Trustees. The Freeh Report is full of unsupported suggestions, and the NCAA has punished student-athletes who were blameless in this situation. Joe Paterno was the poster child for success with honor and education before athletics. He changed the culture of college football. When I was Lieutenant Governor, I used to stand on the sidelines with Penn State lettermen during games. Sure, there were grumbles about how tough Joe made life for them. But, several of them became doctors and successful businessmen on the foundation created on that football field and by Joe Paterno. That is something we cannot forget."

#4: The Board of Trustees has made change, but it isn't enough. "Certainly there have been some reforms, but they are modest. Most of them are cosmetic. It is time for real change. That means making all state-related universities accountable under the Right-to-Know Law and holding trustees accountable under the Ethics Act. That is change."

#5: The PSU nation deserves the truth. "This is not over until the truth comes out. I feel that I am representing the Penn State nation when I attend and speak at various rallies around the state. All anyone wants is the truth. I want to be part of making that happen."
