# THE STATE OF BETA SIG

# Here's 5 Things We'd Tell Another Chapter About Rebuilding

When Beta Sigma Beta started in 1913, it was the 13th fraternity on Penn State's campus. Over many years and changes in the growth of the fraternities throughout the country, the men of the Penn State Chapter, following an unsuccessful attempt to merge with Pi Lambda Phi, made the historic decision to become an independent fraternity, Beta Sigma Beta.

Since 1985, Beta Sigma Beta has continued to thrive in its leadership role as part of the Penn State fraternity system.

So when the chapter was suspended in 2019, longtime House Advisor Scott Granoff '86 says it was time to go back to what made Beta Sig so impactful over the past 108 years.

"We've survived a lot of things over those years," he says. "What we're rebuilding here is a culture that cares about each other and takes care of what it has. A brotherhood with older and younger friends to help us through life. We needed to rebuild ... everything."

And they have. Over the past two years, actives, alumni, and the University, have worked together to write a new chapter in Beta Sig's history. Here's what they would tell another fraternity about rebuilding for success.

1) Draw a line in the sand. "When another fraternity advisor tells me that their chapter's house is being disrespected, I tell them that's a warning sign," Scott Granoff says. "Our house became a place to have fun, and the property wasn't respected."

"Our 91-year-old house was getting destroyed because hosting big parties became its reason for being," says **Jeff Stein '89**. "We drew a line in the sand, reevaluated our priorities, and focused our efforts on making the house a safe and healthy place where brothers want to live."

For Beta Sig, the 'line in the sand' meant restructuring both active and alumni roles, and most importantly, a focused return to the fraternity's five pillars—respect, humility, discretion, pride, and unity—while requiring accountability from the undergraduates. Jack Sorkin '22, the 2020 House President, says that wasn't an easy task, especially during COVID, but the hard work was worth it.

"We'd kind of lost our way, which put us at risk of losing our entire history," he says. "But in 2020, we put a lot of emphasis on our five pillars, creating a brotherhood that is unified, respects the house, and the school's rules. There has been a really huge turn around in personal responsibility."

2) Work proactively with the University. Corey Cooperider and Kelci Jacoby from the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life (OFSL) have been working with Beta Sig's undergraduates to make strides in conduct and compliance.

"Beta Sig provided us with some of the best times of our lives. It's our turn to step up and give back and allow a new group of undergrads to enjoy the same benefits."

"It's great to know right off the bat what's expected," 2021 House President Ari Kasman '23 says. He and Jack, along with Scott, credit Corey and Kelci for putting in countless hours providing resources and support for a strong house. Ari says it's helped forge a better relationship with Penn State, and given him confidence as undergraduate and alumni events pick up again in 2021.

**Scott Granoff** says that OFSL has been a valuable resource to partner with.

3) Give back as an alumni. Former Alumni President and current Foundation President Rob Eisman '79 says that alumni investment has been critical to the turnaround.

"Strong and responsible alumni supervision is critical," he says. "Lee Epstein '81 and his team took the helm, committing time and energy to modify undergraduate behaviors and reestablish trust with university and borough officials. These exemplary efforts saved Beta Sig and paved the way for further growth."

He credits advisors **Scott Granoff**, **Jeff Stein '89** and **Gary Brandeis '88** for recruiting a diverse team of energetic brothers (headed by **Jon Spiegel '03**) who are committed to building on Beta Sig's leadership in academic, philanthropic, and responsible social spheres.

4) Invest in the next generation of brothers. Scott Granoff says that he and his fellow advisor are investing heavily in undergrad

leadership. "Every situation goes back to leadership," he says. "When a situation comes up, there's an opportunity for an undergrad leader to say 'that's not what we're about... let's look at this situation from the bigger picture."

He says the house membership is focused on academics and philanthropy, community service, and making a difference in the local community. It's an investment that's paying off: recent philanthropy events like a 3 on 3 basketball fundraiser have been a big success.

"Beta Sig provided us with some of the best times of our lives," **Rob Eisman** says. "It's our turn to step up and give back and allow a new group of undergrads to enjoy the same benefits."

5) Look at the benefits of being a Beta Sig. Sadly, Scott Granoff went to the funeral of Marc Zuckerman '62 in August of 2021. Marc was a Beta Sig leader who arranged quarterly gatherings for members from the late 1940's through the 1960's.

"The rabbi remarked how important Penn State and particularly Beta Sig was to Marc, and he asked his brothers to stand to see how many fraternity members were there," Granoff remembers. "There had to be sixty of us who got up — not just brothers from Marc's class. And it reminded me what makes our thing so special. We're there for each other our entire lives. Being a Beta Sig goes so far beyond four years of college."

"Beta Sig has done so much for so many people," he says. "For me, I feel fortunate to have acquaintances who are 30 years older than me and 30 years younger, just because of how involved I've been. I want it to go on for everyone else. It doesn't have to be the same as it was when I was there — it just needs to continue with the proper purpose."

**Ari Kasman** and the rest of the undergrad leaders are working hard to make that happen. "This is how we want Beta Sig to be — actively making a positive impact. We're creating a new culture at Beta Sig, and I hope it lasts forever."

Everyone felt happy knowing they were doing this for a good cause and helping other people. They were also very motivated for


