When asked what impacted his decision to pledge to Beta Sigma Beta, Jonathan says, "Pledging a Jewish fraternity was important to me which narrowed the field quite a bit. Beta Sigma Beta stood out to me based on what I observed as the closeness of the brothers and the quality of the person that was already a brother."

Jonathan says the brothers and independence of the fraternity is what stood out to him on the campus of fraternities. "Beta Sigma Beta was and remains a local fraternity without any national organization overseeing it. That showed through in the brotherhood with undergrads stepping up and taking on a lot of responsibilities in order to effectively run the house."

Some of his favorite memories in the house included some good, old-fashioned brotherhood bonding. "One of the best memories I have was playing beach volleyball outside the House on nice



weather days. That's something that always seemed to bring brothers together."

Jonathan says that being a part of Beta Sigma Beta affected both his professional and personal lives after graduation. "Taking on leadership roles in the house was far more valuable than I realized at the time. Professionally, it helped me to understand

the value of organizing, delegating and managing others. Personally, I made some of the best friends I've ever had and still maintain today. Life gets really busy, but it's great when we have my pledge class still keeping in touch via group text."

Giving back to the fraternity is crucial for Jonathan. He currently serves on the Beta Sigma Beta alumni board as the President. "Beta Sigma Beta has given a lot to me over the years. Some of that took time to see and other parts were more immediately obvious. I volunteer out of a sense of duty to this great organization and wanting to see it continue to thrive. We are a locally run/organized fraternity and alumni association. We don't have support from a larger national organization. That comes with benefits and disadvantages and certainly brings folks closer together."

Kenny Dubin '86 graduated from Penn State in 1986 with a degree in accounting. After two years in public accounting and passing his CPA, Kenny became a recruiter. After years of working to build his recruiting firm, Kenny recently sold it to a Publicly Traded Company.

Kenny has two sons, Jack (19), an active Beta Sig brother and member of the class of 2025, and Asher (18) as well as a fiancé, Cassi Cohen. Having sold his house in Merion, PA, Kenny plans to spend his time in Margate, NJ and will travel to Florida for the winter.

Kenny Dubin '86 currently serves the Beta Chapter as a General Board Member. Looking back at his past positions, Kenny says, "This is my second stint on the Board after being Treasurer for 6 years in the 90's. I am now seeing the difference in the house and brothers from over the years."

When deciding whether or not to join a fraternity at Penn State, Kenny says the demeanor of the brothers in Beta Sig were his deciding factor. "After starting in the summer in 1986, I reunited with some old camp friends who said they were looking at fraternities. We started to hang out and talk about Beta Sig, and I immediately felt comfortable with the brotherhood. I pledged for a chance to meet friends and enjoy a whole new life experience. Unbeknownst to me, it

would be a life changer that my parents afforded me. Neither of them went to college, but they experienced both Penn State and Beta Sig through my eyes."

Kenny reminisced on his favorite memories from his time in Beta Sig. "The house in the 80's was simply FUN. Different than today's house in which my son, Jack '25, is living in my old room

#12. We had socials with sororities every Friday night, and Formal Dinner every night at 6PM when the Chancellor let us in the dining room. Dinner was fun, and we were able to relive the day's social events, the weekend parties, and simply one laugh after another."

After graduating from Penn State, Kenny started off his career thanks to a Beta Sig alumnus. "A Beta Sig alumni afforded me my first accounting job out of school as well as innumerable social and business contacts."

Not only did Beta Sig prepare Kenny for his professional life, but he owes it to the fraternity for connecting him to many lifelong friendships. Kenny says, "I value [these friendships] more than anything. To this day, my closest friends are part of Beta Sig: my pledge class (Spring of 83),

When I proudly say, 'Yes I was a Beta Sig', I get two responses: 1. They threw great parties! 2. Do you know......"

After all his years and experiences with Beta Sig, Kenny chooses to give back to the fraternity that gave him so much. "To get, you must give. I give my time, advice, and knowledge to the Board. In response, I get satisfaction knowing that the House is still there, standing and thriving."


Throwback to Beta Sigma Beta in 2005

The origin of Beta Sigma Beta can be traced back to October 22, 1910 at Cornell University. This fraternity would be based on the principles of scholarship, mutual aid, and companionship. At the time they chose the name Beta Samach. The ideals of the fraternity spread elsewhere and in 1913 a second chapter was established at Penn State. In its early years, the men of Beta Samach, Beta Chapter resided in a boarding house on Allen Street. However, the house grew inadequate for the needs of the members, so in 1930 the present house was constructed. In 1972, the national chapter

of Beta Sigma Rho decided to merge with Pi Lambda Phi Fraternity in hopes of strengthening the remaining chapters. In exchange for financial assistance, all Beta Sigma Rho Chapters would change their name and adopt a new set of traditions. On some campuses, this merger enjoyed a degree of success. However, at Penn State, the brotherhood and alumni of Beta Chapter felt that they would rather remain as an independent fraternity then give up their traditions. In the spring of 1975, Beta chapter of Beta Sigma Rho was officially chartered by Pennsylvania State University as Beta Sigma Beta fraterntiy.
